Government Brennen College offers both Undergraduate and Postgraduate Programs in accordance with the academic framework and schedule established by the University of Kannur. The institution boasts recognized Research Centers and operates on a Semester system with a choice-based credit mode. Ensuring effective curriculum delivery is a priority, achieved through thorough monitoring overseen by an Academic Monitoring Committee. Departments, alongside the IQAC, coordinate programs aimed at meeting curricular objectives. Faculty members implement a structured teaching approach and maintain detailed records. At the beginning of each academic year, students are introduced to course objectives through a General Orientation Program. The college provides a mentoring system, a well-stocked library, and hosts seminars and outreach initiatives.

Instructors utilize innovative methods, audiovisual aids, and ICT-enabled tools for teaching. Content sharing and discussions are facilitated through WhatsApp groups. MOODLE serves as the learning management system, while peer teaching and interdisciplinary approaches enrich curriculum delivery. Department Associations facilitate discussions and engage distinguished alumni with students. The Academic Monitoring Committee functions as a feedback conduit, communicating curriculum-related concerns to the University Boards of Studies (BoS) based on input from various stakeholders.

By orchestrating a variety of value-added programs, the institution aligns its curriculum with its mission, aiming to enhance student awareness of social and environmental issues. These programs encompass activities like water and soil analysis, film studies, yoga and meditation, aerobics, and civil service coaching. Mentors and tutors engage students in regular discussions on core values such as gender equality, sustainable development, human rights, and professional ethics. Numerous undergraduate programs underscore these values through relevant coursework, emphasizing professional ethics, human values, gender sensitization, and environmental awareness. Both the NSS and NCC actively involve students in activities promoting discipline, patriotism, and community service, including initiatives like awareness programs on organic farming, breast cancer prevention, blood donation, and stem cell detection. The Nature Club is dedicated to nature and environmental conservation. Additionally, the college's career guidance and placement cell provides instruction on professional etiquette. In

the second semester, a common course titled 'Green Voices' extensively covers sustainable development, ecology, and regional environmental issues, such as the impact of endosulfan in the Kasaragod region. Furthermore, the M.A. English program offers specialized courses on women's writing and Dalit writing. The college hosts a wide array of events including seminars, discussions, lectures, orientations, film screenings, drama performances, exhibitions, book fairs, and literary festivals to promote the assimilation of curricular objectives.

The institution ensures comprehensive communication with students and parents regarding the internal assessment process through

avenues like the prospectus, orientation classes, and departmental PTA meetings. This transparency allows students to grasp the course structure, syllabus, evaluation methods, and career prospects. In compliance with Kannur University's directives, the institution conducts evaluations, tests, assignments, and projects with utmost transparency. Key aspects of the internal assessment include:

1. Each department conducts internal tests per university guidelines, ensuring confidentiality in question paper preparation and advance display of exam timetables.
2. Prompt evaluation of answer scripts, followed by public display of marks and a subsequent parents' meeting.
3. Offering retests to enable students, especially slow learners, to improve their scores.
4. Granting students the autonomy to select assignment topics and ensuring timely submissions with feedback.
5. Detailed documentation of attendance, with monthly records accessible to students.
6. Consideration of various factors like attendance, assignment quality, and exam performance in Internal Assessment scores, allowing students to verify and address grievances.
7. Supervised monitoring and external evaluation of field trips, industrial visits, and specimen collection.
8. Provision of project supervision for guidance and support, with external evaluation.
9. Ensuring verified marks are uploaded to the university website within stipulated timeframes, following a thorough four-tier verification process involving faculty, tutors, Heads of Departments, and the Principal.

Adhering to Kannur University's guidelines for internal examinations, the institution ensures transparency and efficient operations. Oversight of the process is entrusted to the Principal and Chief Superintendent of Examinations. Confidential preparation of question papers and stringent measures against malpractice are implemented. Addressing examination-related concerns and answer script evaluations, the Students Grievance Cell plays a pivotal

role. Students are introduced to the internal evaluation system and its components at the commencement of each program. Grievances are initially directed to respective teachers, tutors, HOD, and Principal, with the option for direct recourse to the Grievance Cell if necessary. Predefined criteria for internal marks calculation are communicated in advance, allowing students to independently verify their marks with minimal errors. Internal mark sheets are provided for student verification and signature before uploading to the university website. Semester-end parent-teacher meetings evaluate students' academic progress. Notably, recent years have seen minimal grievances regarding examinations, evaluation, or internal marks. Remedial support is extended to slow learners, with supplementary tests offered to students facing genuine challenges.

To address its academic and developmental requirements, the college receives both plan and non-plan funds from the state government. A detailed proposal is submitted annually to the Directorate of Collegiate Education for fund allocation, covering various categories such as Faculty Development, Infrastructure, Smart Classrooms, Maintenance, and Field Trips. Additionally, non-plan funds are sought for expenses like electricity, telephone charges, and IT maintenance. The college strategically submits a master plan to the Government of Kerala to secure funds from the Kerala Infrastructure Investment Fund Board (KIIFB). MLA and MP funds are acquired through proposals for specific developmental activities. Furthermore, the college relies on CDC, PTA, and Alumni for fund mobilization. Students contribute a fixed amount during admission, remitted to the government and allocated back to the college alongside a grant for CDC. Voluntary PTA funds support day-to-day expenses and developmental initiatives. Alumni associations contribute through endowments, cultural programs, and placements. With a commitment to effective waste management, the institution implements a "Green Protocol" during seminars and events as a top priority. Prohibiting plastic cups, straws, and flex boards, it emphasizes the use of cloth banners and degradable materials like chart papers for publicity. Digital slides are favored for exhibitions, while steel and glass tumblers are employed for drinks, and only steel utensils are used for food preparation. Solid waste like glass splinters and aluminum scraps is disposed of eco-consciously, and the campus maintains incinerators for waste disposal. Different bins segregate organic and non-biodegradable waste, with organic waste converted to compost and utilized in the organic farm. Recycling initiatives manage non-biodegradable waste, promoting sustainability. The institution aims for a paperless campus through online processes and e-communication. Liquid waste is managed through a well-structured drainage system, and chemical solvents undergo treatment before disposal. Groundwater recharge is prioritized, and efforts to reduce e-waste include regular servicing and returning unavoidable e-waste to companies. Awareness programs and documentaries educate students on the dangers of e-waste, aligning with government guidelines for e-waste management and proper disposal through the Public Works Department (PWD).

The institution ensures comprehensive communication with students and parents regarding the internal assessment process through avenues like the prospectus, orientation classes, and departmental PTA meetings. This transparency allows students to grasp the course structure, syllabus, evaluation methods, and career prospects. In compliance with Kannur University's directives, the institution conducts evaluations, tests, assignments, and projects with utmost transparency. Key aspects of the internal assessment include:

1. Each department conducts internal tests per university guidelines, ensuring confidentiality in question paper preparation and advance display of exam timetables.
2. Prompt evaluation of answer scripts, followed by public display of marks and a subsequent parents' meeting.
3. Offering retests to enable students, especially slow learners, to improve their scores.
4. Granting students the autonomy to select assignment topics

and ensuring timely submissions with feedback.

5. Detailed documentation of attendance, with monthly records accessible to students.
6. Consideration of various factors like attendance, assignment quality, and exam performance in Internal Assessment scores, allowing students to verify and address grievances.
7. Supervised monitoring and external evaluation of field trips, industrial visits, and specimen collection.
8. Provision of project supervision for guidance and support, with external evaluation.
9. Ensuring verified marks are uploaded to the university website within stipulated timeframes, following a thorough four-tier verification process involving faculty, tutors, Heads of Departments, and the Principal.

Adhering to Kannur University's guidelines for internal examinations, the institution ensures transparency and efficient operations. Oversight of the process is entrusted to the Principal and Chief Superintendent of Examinations. Confidential preparation of question papers and stringent measures against malpractice are implemented. Addressing examination-related concerns and answer script evaluations, the Students Grievance Cell plays a pivotal role. Students are introduced to the internal evaluation system and its components at the commencement of each program. Grievances are initially directed to respective teachers, tutors, HOD, and Principal, with the option for direct recourse to the Grievance Cell if necessary. Predefined criteria for internal marks calculation are communicated in advance, allowing students to independently verify their marks with minimal errors. Internal mark sheets are provided for student verification and signature before uploading to the university website. Semester-end parent-teacher meetings evaluate students' academic progress. Notably, recent years have seen minimal grievances regarding examinations, evaluation, or internal marks. Remedial support is extended to slow learners, with supplementary tests offered to students facing genuine challenges.

The collected feedback forms are then analyzed by the IQAC, and if necessary, the principal confidentially counsels faculty members based on the findings. Future placements and promotions are contingent upon these reports. The college relies on various funding sources, including budgetary allocations from the Kerala Government, grants from UGC and RUSA, and contributions from stakeholders such as the PTA and Alumni. All financial resources undergo rigorous auditing procedures, both internally and externally. Regular audits are conducted by the Directorate of Collegiate Education to verify the utilization of funds, scrutinizing various documents and registers. Additionally, the Office of the Accountant General examines the college's balance sheets and related records. External chartered accountants review specific expenditures, while the Students' Co-operative Society accounts are audited by the Co-operative Society Auditor. Internal audits are conducted annually, followed by the resolution of any audit objections by the council. 6.4.3 - Institutional strategies for mobilization of funds and the optimal utilization of resources

To address its academic and developmental requirements, the college receives both plan and non-plan funds from the state government. A detailed proposal is submitted annually to the Directorate of Collegiate Education for fund allocation, covering various categories such as Faculty Development, Infrastructure, Smart Classrooms, Maintenance, and Field Trips. Additionally, non-plan funds are sought for expenses like electricity, telephone charges, and IT maintenance. The college strategically submits a master plan to the Government of Kerala to secure funds from the Kerala Infrastructure Investment Fund Board (KIIFB). MLA and MP funds are acquired through proposals for specific developmental activities. Furthermore, the college relies on CDC, PTA, and Alumni for fund mobilization. Students contribute a fixed amount during admission, remitted to the government and allocated back to the college alongside a grant for CDC. Voluntary PTA funds support day-to-day expenses and developmental initiatives. Alumni associations contribute through endowments, cultural programs, and placements. Faculty members secure projects and grants from various organizations, contributing to the college's growth. Tuition fees are remitted to the government, while examination fees are paid directly to the University. Special grants from UGC and RUSA, along with user fees from external bodies using college premises, further bolster the college's financial resources.

With a commitment to effective waste management, the institution implements a "Green Protocol" during seminars and events as a top priority. Prohibiting plastic cups, straws, and flex boards, it emphasizes the use of cloth banners and degradable materials like chart papers for publicity. Digital slides are favored for exhibitions, while steel and glass tumblers are employed for drinks, and only steel utensils are used for food preparation. Solid waste like glass splinters and aluminum scraps is disposed of eco-consciously, and the campus maintains incinerators for

waste disposal. Different bins segregate organic and non-biodegradable waste, with organic waste converted to compost and utilized in the organic farm. Recycling initiatives manage non-biodegradable waste, promoting sustainability. The institution aims for a paperless campus through online processes and e-communication. Liquid waste is managed through a well-structured drainage system, and chemical solvents undergo treatment before disposal. Groundwater recharge is prioritized, and efforts to reduce e-waste include regular servicing and returning unavoidable e-waste to companies. Awareness programs and documentaries educate students on the dangers of e-waste, aligning with government guidelines for e-waste management and proper disposal through the Public Works Department (PWD).

With most students coming from underprivileged backgrounds across Kannur, Kasaragod, and Wayanad, the college aims to construct a new ladies' hostel with a capacity for 350 students, equipped with a high-tech kitchen and modern amenities.

Plans include upgrading 20 classrooms to smart classrooms with LCD projectors, Smart Boards, interactive panels, and sound systems. A state-of-the-art language lab for English, French, and German will also be introduced. The zoology department, housed in the newly constructed academic block, will see lab upgrades with advanced equipment for enhanced research capabilities.

Aligned with the National Education Policy, the college will organize training sessions on curriculum design, evaluation, and field activities for faculty, inviting national experts. Departments will host international and national conferences,

bringing in prominent academicians. Additionally, an NSS-led project will build a house for a family in need, fostering students' social commitment.
